





- Prepped and laid sod at the dog park at Ridge Ferry park.
- Painted skate park walls, light poles, and bleachers.
- Put new sand in the volleyball courts at Ridge Ferry park and installed new nets.
- Took down basketball goals at Parks Hoke to start construction of new covered basketball courts and pavilion with restrooms.
- Refurbished picnic tables from lock and dam and relocated to Upper Alto.
- Removed mulch from playgrounds at Riverview, Heritage, Midway, and Shannon parks prepping for pour in place playground surfacing.
- Installed new LED lights at all city facilities.
- New playground installed at Heritage and Riverview Park.
- Paint Riverview score booth and entrance ways.
- Rayburn Electric finished light install at Riverview Park.
- Installed LED lights and exhaust fans at Alto Park
- Pressure washed tin barrier at Etowah park and Banty Jones park

RECREATIONAL GYMNASTICS


